

A report on One Day Historical Tour

Historical tours are an effective and important tool to unravel the past and learn how seemingly mundane places are woven into the fabric of history. Such visits are instrumental in connecting and linking students to the shared past of humankind. Through visiting these places where history occurred students find it easier to connect to their roots and allow them to feel like they are a part of something much bigger and at the same time it humbles them. Besides such tours provide an excellent opportunity to the students and teachers to forge a harmonious relationship and reach a better understanding of each other and their subject matter.

Taking into account all these facts and as a prescribed component of UG history curriculum, the department of History SWCS organized a one day historical tour for UG 2nd Semester students to Nagar Nagar city, Hari Parbat Fort and Baghi Waris Khan, located in the old town of Srinagar on and around the foot hills of Koh-i-Maran. The tour was undertaken by 11 students accompanied by Dr. Shazia Shafiq (Tour coordinator), Prof. Irfana Amin (Department of Botany), Dr.Tariq Ahmad War (Department of Physics) from teaching faculty and Mr. Shahnawaz Sayed, and Mr. Showkat Ahmad from non-teaching staff.







The group left for the site at around 10:00 am in the morning and reached the first venue Hariparbat Fort at around 11:30 am. On the way to fort the students came across the old ruins of Nagar Nagar city built by the Mughal Emperor Akbar in Sixteenth century. The students were apprised about the historical, cultural, economic and political significance of this fort city. The walled city spreading over a few miles around the hillock was built to accommodate Mughal soldiery, ruling class and bureaucracy. It was called Nagar Nagar. The construction began during the period of Akbar and was completed during the time of Jahangir. Initially the Mughal forces had forcibly occupied the private houses causing great problems to the people. It was in response to the sustained resistance against the forced occupation of people's houses by the Mughal army that Akbar thought of building a city not only for the army but for the Mughal ruling class and the bureaucracy. The walled city had two main gates - Kathi Darwaza and Sangin Darwaza. Kathi Darwaza was for general public and the Sangin Darwaza was exclusively meant for the Mughal ruling class. The inscription on one of the main gates of the city called Kathi Darwaza is valuable in that it throws important information on the cost and workforce employed in the construction of the city.

Trekking through the eco-zone of this historical city and climbing more than 100 stair steps the group reached to the summit fort at Hari Parbat Hill. Hariparbat fort is also known as Durrani Fort or Pathan Fort. It is one of the most impressive monuments of Kashmir and is visible from every part of the city. The place has

been of great sanctity in Kashmir. It still presents an impressive view with apartments and tall pillars. However, the monument has 'commonplace' architecture and lacks any remarkable architectural feature. The construction work the site was initiated by Akbar in 1590 by constructing a long wall; however the fort was built by an Afghan Governor Atta Mohammed Khan in 18th century. The fort is surrounded by many religious structures most important among which are Mullah Akhoon Sahib Mosque and Sharika Temples. The monument gives a spectacular view of almost entire old city and particularly a fascinating look of the Dal Lake. This fort is maintained by the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI).
